## News From Your Board Of Trustees

**Sign on 21<sup>st</sup> Street:** The Board and many members of First UU are committed to erecting an electronic sign on 21<sup>st</sup>. Three sign companies have submitted proposals and bids. All the bids are fairly similar. However, only one of the three companies will allow us to pay ½ down and finance the remaining amount over two years at 0% interest. Bottom-line: The Board and Congregation need to find the financing to make the sign a reality. Many avenues are being explored-- No decision has been made. If you are committed to having a sign and want to be part of the conversation, please contact Bonnie Till (722-8208).

**Facilities Rental Policy:** The Board has asked Marsha Diggs with the assistance of Office Manager, Anita Culp, to review the Facilities Rental Policy. Diggs will present any proposed revisions to the Board at the August meeting.

**Locking Door Handle for Meditation Room:** The Camarata Cellista group requested a locking door handle on the door to the room where their 14 cellos and 1 base were stored. This was done and the expense was covered by the Chamber Concert Fund. The door can only be locked or unlocked by using the key. The two keys are located in the church office.

## Minister's Annual Report, June 2014

For our beloved spiritual community at First UU, last year's annual meeting signaled the end of a period of rigorous challenge and protracted growing pains. We weathered the difficulties with remarkable grace and cooperation, based on our love for one another and for the principles and sources of our UU identity. Joyfulness was restored and joyfulness can be discerned in all our activities and projects. Let us rejoice in the activities we shared together that resulted in this outcome.



Briefly, since this time last year, as a community we have consistently demonstrated the best values of the Unitarian Universalist tradition – an unflagging commitment to democratic process; meaningful social activism resulting in building community with those around us; responsible stewardship of our church, leading to steadily improving fiscal health and a modest but encouraging growth of our membership; sustained collegiality in our interpersonal dealings.

In a word, First UU is once again a public church. Once again, without equivocation, we proclaim our identity as servants and agents of Love. Once again, we are a welcoming church, unapologetically, and view our mission as the call to bless the world. We do so by manifesting the core beliefs of progressive religion. This means many things: we stand on the side of Love, acting in many ways to uphold the worth and dignity of all living; we are committed to bringing about justice for all members of society, ensuring that all receive fair and equitable treatment.

We oppose institutions and practices that actively support or promote oppression and injustice; we continue to promote the arts, and we encourage our members and friends to come together in this safe, sacred space we have created to freely and responsibly pursue the search for truth and meaning, each according to the light of his or her conscience, and each according to the revelations of his or her advancing consciousness.

Of course, we all have experienced that activity can be “work” when it is tedious, joyless, and enervating. But, as Twain's Tom Sawyer illustrated, activity can be “play” when it lifts the spirit, when it sparks the song, when it scratches the itch, when it fulfills the craving, when it follows the holy passion residing within the heart's deep core. So, we are at choice. So, now let us PLAY!!!

Yes, we have much activity ahead of us to “do.” But, it need not be “work.” Let it be play. Today, we live as all have lived in the past. That is, we live in the best of times and the worst of times. So, as we go forward, I want to reiterate my message today – beloveds, NOW LET US PLAY!

Play what? Here's what: Let us play the part of agents of Love, servants of truth and beauty. The world is clamoring for Love, Truth, and Beauty. Let us play the part of prayerful, confident, visionary community builders, playing for the ascendancy of equal rights, freedom, and justice. The world is desperately craving restorative justice for the crimes and travesties of the past. Let us PLAY as dreamers envisaging a better, richer, kinder, and more beautiful world. The world is waiting to dance free of fear.

So, let us PLAY for keeps. And let us be confident of success, because the power is ours to PLAY to win. After all, the earth and its bounty are not ours as an inheritance from our ancestors. Rather, the earth and the fullness thereof is a sacred trust we tender as its faithful stewards, entrusted to protect and preserve its goodness and its beauty for our children's children, and for theirs, without end, for the joyful celebration and perpetuation of Love. This year just past has been a good year. Today we are together at the beginning of an even better year. It starts right now, this morning. Thank you very much.

**“No Gun” sign:** The Board agreed that the decision to post or not to post the “No Gun” sign on the door of the church is a congregational decision. **“Making the Annual Pledge Drive Obsolete”:** Michael Durall has had a new book published, “Making the Annual Pledge Drive Obsolete”. The Board plans to launch a congregational read of this book and discuss the possibility of making the annual pledge drive obsolete at First UU.

## UUA Mid-America Region: Some Fun Facts

Pop quiz: What 12 states make up our region? An easy way to remember them might be connecting their Native American language name with the state name. Thanks to UUA Mid-America website for the information.

**Kansas** is easy: From the name of the Kansa people, meaning "south" for People of the South Wind.

According to the website [www.native-languages.org/state-names.htm](http://www.native-languages.org/state-names.htm) twenty-six of the names of the fifty United States of America are based on words in Native American languages. Of those twenty-six, twelve are in Mid-America:

**Illinois:** "Illiniwek," the name of the Illini people, meaning "best people."

**Indiana:** the only one of our 13 MidAmerica states which is not named with a specific Native American name.

"Indiana" means Land of the Indians or Land of Indians. Multiple Native American nations are a significant part of Indiana history, including the Miamis, Chippewa, Delawares, Erie, Shawnee, Iroquois, Kickapoo, Potawatomes, Mahican, Nanticoke, Huron, and Mohegan.

**Iowa:** A tribal name of the Ioway people, meaning "sleepy ones."

**Kentucky:** from "Kentake," an Iroquois place name meaning "meadow land."

**Michigan:** "Mshigem" or "Misigami" are Potawatomi and Ojibwe names for "great lake." English speakers call the great lake Lake Michigan.

**Minnesota:** "Mnisota" is the Dakota Sioux name for the river English speakers call the Minnesota River. It means "cloudy water."

**Missouri:** The name of a people native to the area, "Missouria, came from the word "mihsoori," meaning "big canoe people."

**Nebraska:** "Nibthaska" or "Nibrathka," the Omaha-Ponca and Otoe names for the river which English speakers call the Platte River, meaning "flat river."

**North Dakota:** From the Dakota, meaning "the allies."

**Ohio:** from "Ohiyo," the name which English speakers call the Ohio River in the Seneca language, meaning, "it is beautiful."

**South Dakota:** From the Dakota, meaning "the allies."

**Wisconsin:** "Wishkonsing" is the Ojibwe name for the river which English speakers call the Wisconsin River. The Ojibwe sources say the meaning of "Wishkonsing" is unknown.

### **Wednesday Evening Book Club:**

We will not be meeting in July due to travel and vacations. We will reconvene on Wednesday, August 13 to talk about John Esposito's book *What Everyone Needs to Know About Islam*. In the aftermath of the terrorist attacks of September 11th, there has been an overwhelming demand for information about Islam. As a leading expert, John Esposito has found himself called upon to speak to a wide range of audiences. Out of this experience, he has identified the most pressing questions people consistently ask about Islam. ### **Eclectic Readers Group:**

Margaret Atwood's *The Blind Assassin* is the July 18<sup>th</sup> selection. Atwood, a Canadian, has published more than 25 books, including fiction, poetry and essays. Many consider this novel, which won the prestigious Booker Prize, possibly her best work. It's hard to pin down the genre as several rich stories are woven together.
