Meditation, Mysticism & Consciousness

Kathy Hull is offering a four-week intensive class in multi-faith meditation techniques meeting Thursdays, February 5th to 26th. Each session will meet 6:30 to 8:00 pm, at First Unitarian Universalist Church. Discussion topics will include mystical and scientific understandings of consciousness, and the effects of silence and sound, stillness and movement, in meditative practice. Techniques include chanting, walking & dancing meditations, and compassionate communication practice.

Fee for the class is \$60 in advance or four \$20 weekly installments. Work-exchange scholarships & childcare available by arrangement. Meet George Riviera

George plays chess. It's not easy imagining him sitting in quiet contemplation over his next move as he's much more an outgoing man of action. He spent his childhood in Los Angeles and was baptized a Roman Catholic, and understood that "You must have faith and you can't ask questions" from his godparents, one of whom read tarot cards. He argued with a godmother about the nature of God, remembered nothing of learning the catechism, nor was he confirmed. During 3rd grade, George was converted by a neighbor to a Christian sect where people spoke in tongues and the women wore long dresses to cover their bodies. Despite those extremes, George loved being a Christian and talking about Christianity until his early 20's, when he read *The Da Vinci Code*, which made him question his sense of self and his faith. It made him ask if there was a god, if he was wrong about the nature of Jesus – and if so, were we possibly mistaken about everything else? Up to then he had thought his relationship with God to be personal, but at that time he felt that talking to God was empty of meaning. He read about others who questioned faith. He listened to the irreverent comedy of George Carlin and Bill Hicks and read the evolutionary biology writings of Richard Dawkins. At this point, George entered his "atheist period."

George has always liked jobs where he deals with people, customer service, waiting tables. He's also profoundly sensitive to effects of social and political changes on his and our world. 9/11 happened while he was in high school: immediately it was "all prayers and patriotism." And after the Columbine shootings, the student body was subjected to weapon searches with metal detectors, but it was mostly "the loners, punk kids, and those who stood out" who were picked on.

Currently he's selling auto parts – but this is only a fraction of what George does with his life. Recently he had an organizing job with Kansas Peoples Action, fighting for voter rights and working to unseat Kobach and Brownback. He organized the Get Out the Vote Campaign, hiring student canvassers to do phone surveys from October up to the election. Currently he is a paid intern with the Communication Workers of America. He has also canvassed for Trust Woman. He is involved with the atheist group Meet Up.com, which matches people with similar but non-militant interests for discussion of "Life in the Bible Belt" and how to cope with political frustration and anger. He also meets with the Doom and Gloom Group to have a beer at Kirby's on Mondays, is an active member of Films for Action (a huge catalog of documentaries on areas of social and political concern), and recently has become friends with Peter Joseph, the state coordinator for Zeitgeist Films. See what I mean about Man of Action!

George, now agnostic, reached First UU through the Occupy Wall Street Movement and attended a Meatless Monday, where he met UU members. He has been attending services with Louis Goseland: he likes many things about UU from the COEXIST bumper stickers on cars to UU respect for the faith of others, and a genuine effort to "create a planet we can live in." He would like to see more diversity, more young people interacting at the church and to learn more about the faith of others. Above all, he would like First UU congregation members to donate food and time to hosting an occasional meal at the Lord's Diner, where people who are not religious but like to talk about faith need the community of a liberal church.

President's Report, continued

- W.U.U.P.S - Plans for next year include 12 full moon celebrations, as well as Beltane, May Day, and major holidays.
- Denominational Affairs - Members are encouraged to attend the MidAmerica Region annual meeting which will be April 17-19 in Naperville, IL, and the national General Assembly this June 24-28 in Portland, OR.
- Worship Committee - The minister will be on vacation for several Sundays in January, returning to the pulpit on the 25th. The Worship Committee is arranging some very interesting guest speakers.
- Fundraising - Del Smith has proposed a silent auction for Valentine's Day.
- Communications - Jack Regehr is updating the website.
- Social Action - 1. Church members have been involved in several actions related to the non-indictments in Ferguson and New York. 2. Food Bank, Bags of Blessings, Mitten Tree, and the coat drive are being collected at church. 3. Several church members have met with Julie Burkhart of Trust Women to discuss how we can be of assistance. 4. Rev. Carter and other members have been involved in creating other social action opportunities.
- Membership - We are happy to announce that George Rivera joined the church.
- Finance - Now that the 21st Street sign is almost completed, we will need to start paying off the unpaid balance. Pledged contributions should cover this cost.

January 25th Midyear Meeting:

Voting members will need to attend the Midyear Meeting to vote on the Nominating Committee members and to approve the prospective budget for 2015-2016. The Midyear Meeting will have an introduction to the proposed new bylaws. The proposed bylaws will not be approved at this meeting, rather public discussion will begin and continue for several months. Another vote might be taken at the Midyear Meeting on signs regulating the presence of guns in the building. Do we want to have signs near each entrance that either forbid all guns, or forbid "open carry" guns, or forbid "concealed carry" guns, or not have any signs that limit guns in the building?

Dismantling Injustice Group Resumes in January

We've all seen the news – unarmed black men bring killed by police; even a twelve year old holding a toy gun. Grand Juries that fail to bring indictments against police officers. Incarceration rates for people of color are eight times higher than for white people, while crime rates are similar for both groups. Income inequity is increasing for 99% of Americans, and a Republican controlled Congress will try to keep it that way. The “War on Drugs” has failed, with usage rates almost exactly the same as forty years ago, despite the expenditure of many billions of dollars and the imprisonment of millions.

Go to the UUA website (www.UUA.org) for information on all these issues, along with statements from UUA President Reverend Peter Morales concerning the recent grand jury decisions, as well as on other issues (the homepage also features a video holiday message from Rev. Morales.)

So what can we of First UU do here at home? The thing to do is become involved. Sunflower Community Action is actively involved in these and other issues. And please come to the next Dismantling Injustice Task Force meeting, on Tuesday, January 27th, at the church. We are working on actions that we as a church can act on together and individually to solve the problems we face here in Wichita, in Kansas, and as a nation. 11:30 am, Friday, January 16. Alice McDermott's *Charming Billy* is our selection. This book, winner of the 1998 National Book Award for Fiction is typical of McDermott's fiction, reflective of the way an individual's life can be distorted by the expectations of others. The *New York Times* reviewer noted that "her characters are mostly decent people -- yet they find themselves struggling to maintain their dignity in the face of increasing evidence that the world is a much darker, more capricious place than any of them cares to acknowledge. Telling stories is a reassuring way to sort things out, but storytelling (or, to be less gracious, lying) is always, as someone in *Charming Billy* puts it, 'a matter of interpretation.'"

We'll return to an old classic in February. Ernest Hemingway's *The Old Man and the Sea* was written in 1951 in Cuba and published in 1952. It was the last major work of fiction he wrote and published in his lifetime. One of his most famous works, it is the story of an aging fisherman struggling with a giant marlin in the Gulf Stream. Winner of the Pulitzer Prize in 1953, it was cited by the Nobel Committee as contributing to Hemingway receiving the Nobel Prize in Literature in 1954.
