Snow Days

Snow season is here. When the weather is bad, the President makes the decision on canceling services based on whether it is safe for congregants to be out driving and on the weather forecast for Saturday night. One-quarter inch of ice may be worse than six inches of snow. The President tries to make the decision no later than mid-Saturday afternoon so there is time to get the word out to congregants. This sometimes means the weather improves Saturday night but the decision was already made.

Closings are posted on Facebook and ListServe, and the three local TV stations are notified: KWCH (broadcast channel 12), KAKE (broadcast channel 10), and KSN (broadcast channel 3). Of those three, KWCH is the most reliable as they use an automated system, and the message goes on their crawl line within a few minutes of notification. Look for "First Unitarian Universalist – Wichita" on the crawl line. If you don't have a TV, feel free to contact Anita Culp at her home telephone number, 744-2840.

As for when we do have church services after a snow storm, the church has a snow-plowing contract for the parking lot for snowfall amounts over two inches. The company is good about getting the job done before the Sunday service. As always, the decision is yours about venturing out in bad weather. We want you to be safe.

Rev. Carter undertook formal study of Far Eastern philosophy and religion in 1967. In 1972, he graduated from Maharishi International University in Fiuggi Fonte, Italy, and for more than a decade taught yoga philosophy and spiritual practice in and around New York. In 1984, he met distinguished Vaishnava polymath, His Holiness Tamal Krishna Goswami, and began extensive training with him in the U.S. and India. Carter was ordained by Goswami as a Gaudiya Vaishnava priest in 1989 and then completed undergraduate work in Philosophy and Religion at Southwestern College, Kansas, followed by graduate work at the Graduate Theological Union, Starr King School for the Ministry, in Berkeley, California.

A Call to Action for the Planet–But Let’s Just Start Local

Every time we drive past our mural dedicated to consideration of our place in the Web of Life, do we consider how we can restore the planet and create healthy living environments for all communities? How difficult is it to connect effectively with these issues? Following the election, there is enough uncertainty about the future of the environment to warrant a serious look at issues which may not receive priority in the next administration.

On Saturday, December 10, our social action coordinator Margi Ault-Duell and Green Sanctuary co-chairs Linda Jordan and Ned Lakin convened the first Green Sanctuary all-day workshop as part of our Green Sanctuary certification process. The thrust of the workshop, attended by thirteen congregation members, was to instill new awareness and implement a plan of action for First UU to be part of the EcoJustice grassroots movement.

Following a showing of *The Story of Stuff*, an eye-opening animated documentary (available on YouTube) about the technology-business-consumer cycle which grips our world, we assessed our relationship to the environment, discussed a survey to find out what members of the congregation do to recycle and promote sustainable living, and discussed further steps to promote environmental awareness. Beginning with elements most vital to human life in our immediate environment – air, water, food, waste, energy, and land – we selected ones we would like to investigate for the next workshop at First UU from 12-3 p.m. on Saturday, January 14.

What Makes First UU First UU?

January follows hard upon a time traditionally associated with giving, a time of caring and compassion extended to family and friends, and often to the wider community. Caring and compassion does not begin and end with the holiday season at First UU. Our ministry has expanded in several directions as we live the Principles of Unitarian Universalism.

Some projects are seasonal, such as December's "Mitten Tree" decorated with warm winter clothing destined for InterFaith Ministry's Operation Holiday, our tradition for many years. Additionally, "Because We Care," a fund to help families during the holiday season was started in December 2016. In February, we contribute to the annual Bags of Blessings, described in Marcia Ellsworth's article in this issue. The kids in Religious Exploration Classes help assemble the Bags of Blessings and are involved in other projects throughout the year.

In 2013, the congregation decided to make the Food Bank a year-round project, rather than a special occasion linked to the holiday season. A new year-round project is the "adoption" of two Haitian students, Blaise Roudgina, 9th grade, and Vincent Kervantz, 8th grade. Our Social Justice Team, on behalf of the congregation, acted after learning from Dagny Casteli of Global Faith in Action that children in Haiti must rely upon sponsors if they are to get any kind of education. Photos and information about Blaise and Vincent are displayed at church. Several members of the congregation are also sponsoring students in Haiti.

Other projects are situational, a prime example being the winter clothing, camping gear and bottled water collected to support the Standing Rock water defenders near the construction of the Dakota Access Pipeline through tribal lands in North Dakota. Reverend Carter has a discretionary fund that he uses as situations arise, usually funded by a second collection plate at a worship service or two. The Caring Committee also occasionally solicits funds to help people who need assistance to purchase food or gas.

First UU has a history of sponsoring community events as funds permit. Through individual donations, we sponsored the Trust Women Gala in November. Plans are in the making for sponsoring Pridefest next year and to have a table at the event and an ad in the Pridefest guide, in addition to our parade participation.

Every member and friend – from the youngest to the oldest, the spryest to the less abled – can take part in some way in our outreach ministry. Many show up at rallies and community activities wearing their green First UU shirts, living the motto, "Be the change you wish to see" in the world. These congregation-wide and individual acts of caring and compassion, honoring the inherent worth and dignity of every person, and acceptance and respect for others reflects First UU values – not just during the holidays, but all year long. As President Corey reminded us in his December column, our Principles "stand strong as a beacon to guide our steps.... Let us shine that light with grace, determination, and compassion."

For February, it's Bags of Blessings from the heart! There is still over a month to start collecting travel-sized hygiene items for the Bags of Blessing 2017. This social action campaign is a collaborative effort among individuals, groups, businesses, and congregations to meet hygiene needs in our community. Each year, Partners for Wichita coordinates this project. Last year, about 2,000 bags of blessings were collected and given out to shelters and assistance centers in the greater Wichita area. Our congregation has been very generous in the past. Last year, First UU collected about 50 bags for the cause.

If you can help, there will be a box for your items in the gathering space until Sunday, February 9. Fill one or more ziplock **gallon-sized** bags with the following items, or bring un-bagged individual items for our young people to bag. *Please bring only new, small/travel size, non-fragrant items for people of all ages.*

Each gallon sized bag should contain one of each of the following: soap, bar or liquid; lotion; razor; shaving cream; shampoo/conditioner; toothpaste; toothbrush; deodorant; comb; Chapstick/lip balm; washcloth; Kleenex/tissues; emery board or clippers; Band-Aids/bandages (3); and white socks.

Raising UUs

Trust Kids: Being raised in a UU church was a liberating experience for me. I was encouraged to question, explore, dissent. I wasn't told what to wear, or what to think. I felt accepted, and I intuitively grasped that the acceptance was genuine and unconditional – no strings attached. Looking back, the word that comes to mind is trust.

Trusting your kids is hard. We naturally want the best for our kids, and it's painful to see them make mistakes. In fact, I think it is more painful for us than it is for them. Do you know how anticipation can make an experience seem so much worse than it really is? As a kid I dreaded going to the doctor to get a shot. But in reality the unpleasantness was about 98% anticipation and 2% actual pain.

Watching our kids make mistakes is like that: we see the pain coming long before they feel it, so we get the 98% that is the anticipation, and they get the 2% that is the actual pain. But the pain is important. The painful shot delivers the vaccine; the painful consequence delivers the life lesson. We need to remember this so that we can trust our kids enough to let them make mistakes.

The adults who led our youth groups and chaperoned our overnights must have known this. To be clear, they kept us safe: they didn't let us make the kind of mistakes that were really serious. But they didn't try to protect us from the scrapes and bruises of growing up, either. And for that, I will always be grateful.
