






Headwaters of the Ark River




A Braided Sandy Prairie River...







Coronado's Expedition, *Frederic Remington*, 1898.



As agriculture came to the plains so did the need for water. The first irrigation ditch was dug in western Kansas around Garden City in 1880 following a drought in the late 1870s. Communities in eastern Colorado quickly followed the Kansans' example.



- E. DeEtte Huffman founded the Arkansas River Coalition in 1997 with a Sierra Club sustainability grant
- The Arkansas River Coalition's mission is to protect, restore and improve the entire watershed and enhance the well-being of all life it sustains.
- It is a 501 (c) (3) non-profit incorporated organization

- Members of the ARC lobby at the local and the state level on behalf of the Arkansas River
- The ARC is trying to set up small groups of concerned citizens in every town along the Arkansas River. We want people who live near the river to form groups and work with us to ensure a clean and healthy river. Each group would take responsibility for a section, observe it, clean it up when necessary, and be alert to problems.
- There is a great need to get the public to know and be proud of the river instead of looking at it as something to tolerate because they don't understand it.
- Making the river accessible for everyone 's enjoyment is a goal of the ARC
