Weather Closing Information

Winter weather in Kansas means the possibility of snow and ice. When the weather is bad, the Board Co-Presidents make the decision on canceling in-person Sunday services based on the safety of congregants to be out driving, relying on the weather forecast for Saturday night. The Co-Presidents try to make the decision no later than mid-Saturday afternoon so there is time to get the word out to congregants. This sometimes leads to confusion if the weather improves Saturday night and the decision to cancel in-person services has already been made. We may be able to pivot and still have a Sunday Zoom service but that may not be possible.

Closings are posted on Facebook, the church website, and ListServe; and three local TV stations are notified: KWCH (broadcast channel 12), KAKE (broadcast channel 10), and KSN (broadcast channel 3). Of those three, KWCH is the most reliable, as it uses an automated system, and the message goes on their crawl line within a few minutes of notification. Look for "First Unitarian Universalist Ch--Wichita" on the crawl line. The church telephone message will also announce the closing. If you do not have a TV, feel free to contact Anita Culp at her home telephone number, (316) 744-2840.

When we do have church services after a snowstorm, the church has a snow-plowing contract for the parking lot for snowfall amounts over two inches. The company is good about getting the job done before the Sunday service. As always, the decision is yours about venturing out in bad weather. We want you to be safe.

Mid-Year Congregational Meeting

The church's annual Mid-Year Congregational Meeting will be January 23, 2022, beginning at 12:15 p.m. The meeting will be held in-person at First UU Church with additional participation by Zoom. The meeting agenda will include the Co-Presidents' State of the Congregation, a report from the Finance Committee on the proposed budget for the 2022-2023 fiscal year, and a vote on that proposed budget. Other reports from committees may also be given.

Voting at the meeting will be done in three ways: in-person ballot, using the voting function in Zoom, or using an absentee ballot. Members eligible to vote will receive an absentee ballot in the mail. If you plan to attend and vote using Zoom, please keep in mind that only one person per Zoom connection can vote using Zoom. You also must sign on and be registered in Zoom as yourself; if you are signed on as a co-host, you will not be able to use Zoom to vote.

Alternative Gift Market

As you probably know, 1st UU's Social Action Committee sponsored a table at this year's community-wide Alternative Gift Market. According to the published results, the market was a huge success! Our UU table promoted medical care for Haitian schools. Donations to our cause will provide medical boxes for 15 mobile, school-based clinics in Haiti. Thanks to all church members who supported this project by volunteering that day, donating to the cause, or sewing felt bears to give as a token for donations. Special thanks to Joe Lozano who organized the event for us. I think the Wichita community and our church together have made a significant impact Around The World.

Kansas Interfaith Action (KIFA)

Our Social Action Committee has affiliated with Kansas Interfaith Action (KIFA), a statewide organization of churches committed to addressing social problems. KIFA devotes much of its attention to working with the state legislature. The goals of KIFA for the coming legislative session include Medicaid Expansion, Payday Loans, Food Sales Tax, Education Honesty with Critical Race Theory, and Climate and Clean Energy.

We can help. Each of us can do something to help improve life in Kansas by working with KIFA. Here are examples of actions we can take, ranging from more intense to less intense.

- 1. Attend the February 15 Legislative Advocacy Day in Topeka where we will personally visit with legislators.
- 2. Participate in the February 16 and 17 Virtual Legislative Advocacy Days when we will communicate with legislators via the Internet and telephone.
- 3. During the legislative session, you will receive Action Alerts on the KIFA issues. The alerts will contain names and addresses of legislators to contact, along with issue points you may raise in your communication. One of our church friends, Senator Mary Ware, anticipates that the Action Alerts will be useful in helping advance KIFA's goals.

The whole motion of the holiday season as half the world goes dark, is toward remembering and waiting for the quiet conviction that each life within all life is a gift. We must be willing to travel through darkness and silence, to wait for the words to give voice to the holy within us.

1/16/22: Rev. Joe Mohr presents "Make Believe."

Let's be honest, there is nothing magical or special that happens when the clock strikes 12 on New Year's Eve that makes us new people. However, we can't help believe and feel a newness, the freedom to reauthor ourselves under the auspice of resolutions. The power to believe in a better version of yourself fuels our resolve. Wake up to potential this year and be mindful of who you are.

The exponential growth of information available to us because of technological advances has an adverse impact on our ability to filter out unimportant information so that we can pay attention to what matters. 1/30/22: Commissioner Lacey Cruse presents "A Place to Call Home: A Glimpse into the Unhoused Needs in Sedgwick County."

Homelessness is often a visual representation of mental illness and substance misuse. Commissioner Lacey Cruse will share the work being done with the Mental Health and Substance Abuse Coalition and how a system-wide change is in order to help those struggling. She will also touch on how our current criminal justice system plays a vital role in society but must shift from a punishment mentality to one more focused on rehabilitation in order to see real, tangible change.
