### **March 2022**

So here we are, going into the third month of 2022, and the isolation we thought would be temporary is beginning to weigh heavily, at least for me. It's discouraging, yet as always, there is another side, too. Ideas and books keep popping up, along with the "news", such as it is; and in the midst of it all, two books, which I'll get to after a while, have taken on a lot of meaning for me.

But first, another matter has grabbed my attention. As you know, we have been made aware of a growing book censorship movement throughout the country that must be countered if we are to maintain the freedom of thought and access to knowledge we have taken for granted. And an article in Truthout by Eleanor Bader, "As the Right Censors Public Libraries, Families are Forming Banned Book Clubs" inspired me to wonder what we might do right here at U-U Wichita.

What if we were to create our own "banned book club"? After all, the isolation isn't going to last forever, and I would love to see an expansion of our library space where there is comfortable seating and a special section of books for parents and kids to share. If this sparks any interest, perhaps we might put some plans together to bring this about?

Now, for the two books. First of all is "Unsettling Truths: The Ongoing, Dehumanizing Legacy of The Doctrine of Discovery" by Mark Charles and Soong-Chan Rah. Mark Charles is a man of Navajo and Dutch descent and brings a unique background to his understanding of Western history; Rah is Professor of Church Growth and Evangelism at North Park Seminary in Chicago, and together they have provided fresh understanding of the rise of colonialism and slavery. A powerful book, indeed.

The second book, "Decolonizing Wealth," by Edgar Villanueva, who brings his Native American heritage and understanding to bear, is a gift that helps us get past the standard "capitalism vs. socialism" stalemate.

This month, we will explore the theme of "Balance" in our worship services from several viewpoints. We hope you will join us.

**March 6:** Andrew Davis brings us *"Hold Tight Loosely."* We know that we are surrounded by change: some, we welcome with open arms; some, we run from as fast as we can; and some, we don't understand at all and hope we can figure it out before it's too late. Andrew explores the balance we each need to create for ourselves in order to negotiate and master change in a way that benefits us without harming others.

**March 13:** Annie Welsbacher will present "*Balancing You, Me and Us.*" Annie Welsbacher will present a sermon by Rev. Megan Lloyd Joiner of the Unitarian Society of New Haven. Originally presented on March 18, 2018, Joyner tells us how being a part of a congregation is about living in a state of balancing – balancing what is offered with what is received, understanding that we all give what we can, when we can, and we will all have seasons in which we need to receive more than we can give; understanding that we may not exactly *want* what another can offer, and yet, when we can, we receive it with grace.

**March 20:** Linda Jordan shares "*Balance/Equinox*" by Rev. Meg Barnhouse interspersed with her own thoughts this Sunday as we consider how each of us goes about trying to achieve "balance within movement" in an ever-changing world.

**March 27:** Rev. Joe Mohr presents *"Being Grey in a Black and White World."* Nowadays, life presents us with many decisions. Our tendency is to seek quick and easy solutions; however, we soon realize that things are never as easy as they seem. Having a balanced life involves being able to live in the in-between spaces.

## Giving Waste Purpose: Meet Brad and Tiffany Dilts

Travis and Katie Folds of Compost ICT, who begun offering their service to 1<sup>st</sup> UU during Ecofest Wichita 2019, are no longer in business. Since 2019, they have been picking up the church compost every Monday morning and leaving two new buckets. Church members have been paying for three months at a time, and during the pandemic, putting household vegetable scraps, casserole disasters, and other kitchen waste out for collection. We have been putting to good use whatever would normally be added to the landfill, in keeping with our seventh principle.

The Folds have sold their farm to Brad and Tiffany Dilts of Serenity Farms, which produces organic vegetables and other home-created foods on land that has been chemical-free for twenty years, as part of CSA, community-supported agriculture. They also have an online store that can arrange to have fresh vegetables, meat, and eggs delivered right to your door: <u>serenityfarmcsa@hushmail.com</u>.

We first became acquainted with Serenity Farms at Ecofest Wichita 2019, when they sold produce, and hope they will do so again on May 1, when Ecofest Wichita 2022 takes place. Meanwhile, two compost buckets picked up weekly cost \$65 for a quarter.
