Bullet Points from the Board 18 May 2022


- Recognizing that we require in-service participants in worship services to be vaccinated, we will be watching the COVID positivity and hospitalization rates carefully. Since vaccinations and treatments for COVID are available, we will try to keep the church open to people wearing masks as long as possible, but encourage all members, visitors, and friends to make choices for their health that best take care of their needs. Once the positivity rate drops below 5 percent we will once again make masks optional.
- As of Monday, May 16, we had pledges totaling \$97,716.00 for the upcoming fiscal year. We will keep the budget approved at the mid-year meeting (\$95,500.00) as it is with one exception: any additional pledged income will be allocated to the Reserve fund for church maintenance.
- Denise Jackson-Simon is retiring as our Director of Children's Religious Education. Denise, thank you for your service. We will be forming a search committee to hire a new RE Director. If you are interested in serving on this committee, please contact Andrew Davis or Kirk Mitchell. Their contact information is in the church directory.
- We can still pay our bills.

Co-President's Message Continued

We had to take action when the positive rate of new COVID cases exceeded the 5 percent rate, and have gone back to requiring masks. I'm sure all of us share the frustration! That rate has increased by 50 percent since we made that decision, and as of last board meeting, was 7.5 percent. It's likely that our hoped-for summer reduction won't be in the cards. Our concern now is if the rate continues to increase to the point where live services would be unwise, and we'd have to go back to only Zoom services.

Rather than relying on just the positive rate of new cases, we'll be looking at hospitalizations and actual number of new cases as well in deciding whether to curtail live services. We recommend getting all available boosters as they've been shown to drastically reduce the need or time for hospitalizations. The therapeutic drugs available for those who do contract COVID have also been shown to do the same. For those who consider the risks unacceptable, we will continue with Zoom services.

From the Worship Committee

Each of us has within us the need to be wanted, to belong to a community. Here we use the term to include family, friends, colleagues, church groups, and community organizations. Spiritually, we need to belong to something greater than ourselves. We don't want to be left outside of the circle. During the month of June, we will consider the meaning of "Widening the Circle" of love and compassion, of inclusion, and of thought as we seek to grow spiritually as individuals and together as a congregation.

<u>June 5:</u> Charlie King brings us "*Drawing on the Wide Side of the Brain*" by the Rev. Rod Richards, Unitarian Universalists of San Luis Obispo. Rev. Richards explores the difficulties inherent in drawing and redrawing a circle wider and leaving open spaces to include others and the necessity of doing so for our own welfare.

<u>June 12:</u> Andrew Davis presents "*The Growth Paradox.*" Andrew suggests we must look within and enlarge our center before we can realistically hope to expand the periphery of our church. We must open ourselves to the possibility that we must shed the limits that have defined us to this point in order to grow into something new.

<u>June 19:</u> Rev. Joe Mohr returns to the pulpit this week to share his musings on this month's theme in "*This Town Ain't Big Enough for the Both of Us.*" Many of us seem to be caught up in ownership and control of resources, power, and things in general. Rev. Joe asks what the world could look like if we could widen our view to learn to share instead.

<u>June 26:</u> Kay Davis presents "Faith in a Post-Fact Era" by Rev. Jude Geiger. Rev. Geiger explores the role of our faith in responding to the rise of White Nationalism and fascism in our nation and the world today. There is a growing tendency in the world for people to ignore fact and adhere to emotional responses that seek to preserve power for those like themselves while marginalizing others. What are we to do if we wish to preserve the worth and dignity of all people in a democratic environment that allows all their stories to be honored?
