We are all on journeys in one way or another. As Rev. Susan Rak observes, "Sometimes the way before us is clearly laid out, and other times not so much. Whether the road is your spiritual journey or your life's course - or the direction of this congregation - the only way to make your way is to step out on the path." Whatever your journey, we invite you to join us for worship each week in July as we come together to support each other in our journeys of personal and spiritual growth.

Worship services for the month include:

<u>7/3:</u> Annie Welsbacher takes us on a "*Journey to Inner Space*" in a homily by Rev. Lynn Strauss. There's a struggle we all come to at different times in our lives - a struggle to free ourselves from old habits, old story lines, outmoded expectations of perfection, the ideal happy outcome. There are things we need to let go. From what do you need to be freed? What mooring do you need to cut, what wall do you need to tear down? Is it your body that needs freeing? Is it unhelpful emotions you need to jettison? Is it your spirit that is tied in knots? This morning we invite you into a journey toward free-floating.

<u>7/10</u>: Andrew Davis presents "A Safe Space to Speak." The easiest journeys to talk about are those filled with sights, sounds, smells, and tastes worth remembering. We share our memories of these journeys easily because they happened "out there," far away from our inner selves. But what about the interior journeys we take that are not so easily put into words? We all need a safe space to tell these stories, because they recall the journeys we take to find and claim our true selves.

<u>7/17</u>: The Rev. Joe Mohr returns this Sunday to share his thoughts about the importance of personal and spiritual journeys to our lives. Watch your Weekly Update and the First UU Facebook page for more information.

7/24: Holly Terrill will deliver "On Setting Out and Coming Home," a sermon by the Rev. Josh Pawelek exploring the meaning and nature of the spiritual journey. Eclectic Readers - Anne Bailey

The book discussion group will be meeting at our regular time, the third Friday, July 15, beginning at 11:30 am for lunch with discussion to follow at 12:00. The book chosen for July is *Their Eyes Were Watching God* by Zora Neale Hurston.

Of Hurston's fiction, *Their Eyes Were Watching God* is arguably the best-known and perhaps the most controversial. The novel follows the fortunes of Janie Crawford, a woman living in the black town of Eaton, Florida. Hurston sets up her characters and her locale in the first chapter, which, along with the last, acts as a framing device for the story of Janie's life. Unlike Richard Wright and Ralph Ellison, Hurston does not write explicitly about black people in the context of a white world—a fact that earned her scathing criticism from the social realists—but she doesn't ignore the impact of black-white relations either.
