From the Worship Committee

Having considered the theme of journey, we turn our exploration to Transformation and Transcendence during the month of August. Every journey leaves us changed, transformed in some way — some we are keenly aware of, and others we may not recognize so readily. Change is a necessary part of our lives — both personally and as a congregation. So, this month we'll reflect on what it looks and feels like, and how we can learn to embrace transformation as a never-ending pilgrimage toward spiritual growth that transcends the present and leads us to wholeness.

Please join us for these worship services in August.

<u>August 7</u>: Lynn Way will present "*Already Broken: A Buddhist Perspective on the Season of Spring*" by Rev. James Ishmael Ford and "*Wandering Pilgrimage*" by Rev. Susan Maginn.

Rev. James Ishmael Ford encourages us to acknowledge the transitory nature of all things and to appreciate everything and everyone in our lives while they are here; to live in the moment rather than putting things off for another day which may not come. Rev. Susan Maginn expands on Ford's ideas as she takes us on a spiritual pilgrimage that reflects on our "wandering toward wholeness, healing and transformation, becoming our deepest and truest selves together, knowing we will stumble along the way, and we will restore one another."

<u>August 14</u>: Andrew Davis brings us "What, So What, Now What," a sermon on transcendence and transformation disguised as observations on the shock of tripping and falling down, the frustration of trying to stand but failing, and the wonder of working our way back onto our feet.

<u>August 21</u>: Rev. Joe Mohr delivers "*Transformers: More Than Meets the Eye.*" Spirituality is the practice of being transformed. We at First UU are a community dedicated to creating space for those reimagining themselves. For some, that may be trying to be a better version of their current self. For others, it might be striving to become a different person entirely. Regardless of where you are on the spectrum of change, know that we are all beings capable of going beyond ourselves.

<u>August 28</u>: Charlie King will present "A People of Transcendence" by Rev. Jude Geiger. Rev. Geiger looks back to the roots of American Liberal Theology to trace the Unitarian transition from our original orthodoxy that contained little about spiritualism up to the birth of Transcendentalism. Geiger notes that Transcendentalists moved us out of strict creed toward a spiritualism that recognizes the Holy within each of us.
