We would still like to hire one more Nursery Attendant, and we hope to get everyone started by September 4. The Committee has done a lot of difficult and time-consuming work to hire this many people in a short time frame, and they are to be commended. They have found some fantastic folks who will be an asset to our church. I look forward to the new staff members becoming part of the fabric of who we are.

#### From the UUA

"Loving with a Broken Heart," by Abbey Tennis, was posted June 29, 2022.

Episcopal priest Gwen Buehrens asks of each seminarian she talks with, "What are you going to do when the church breaks your heart?" It's a question that I return to regularly—because if we spend enough time in this faith tradition, or any faith tradition, it breaks our hearts. Religious community has broken your heart, and it has broken mine.

Our hearts get broken in religious community when we act with selfishness rather than compassion. When we become more attached to our history than to today's call for justice. When we lose sight of our integrity. When we are devastated and no one shows up for us.

The richness that comes from commitment, though, isn't just about one choice. We must choose each other again and again, through conflict and through plenty. The hardest moments of life are the moments when we must choose each other even when our hearts are the most broken.

I do not mean we should never end relationships or commitments. In times of abuse, or in times when our deepest truth calls us in a new direction, ending connections is what is needed.

But it's only when we choose each other again and again—not those who cause us harm, but those who bring healing to the world—that we can cut through the shallowness of our culture that starves our souls. Choosing each other, and choosing once more, is the only way we can become fully known and fully loved.

#### From the Worship Committee

This September, we explore what it means to be "a people of belonging." We've all felt the hunger to be included, the longing to be let in. No one likes standing outside the circle. No one likes leaning against the locked door listening to everyone laughing inside. From the time we are little, belonging is something we seek. It's the hoped-for Holy Grail at the end of our journeys. Or is it just the beginning of our journey?

There are two types of belonging, only one of which is a blessing. If you find yourself being invited to linger rather than leave, warning bells should go off. Be wary of those who welcome you with a club jacket and soft couch. They may have let you in, but soon they will enlist you to help with the work of keeping others out. The true blessing of belonging isn't that you get to come inside the circle; it's that you get to participate in expanding it. Which means maybe our question this month is different than the one we might expect. Instead of "Where can I find belonging?" maybe it is "How can I transform myself into belonging for others?"

We invite you to worship with us each Sunday as we explore these questions and more.

<u>Sept 4</u>: Melanie Jenney presents "Coming Into Our Own" by the Rev. Jude Geiger. Change is inevitable and perpetual in both our lives and our congregation just as it is in the passing of the seasons. What does it look and feel like as we move into a new season in our personal lives or in the life of our congregation? Are we open and accepting of the changes that come in response to new challenges or adversity? And what changes within us if we learn to take the long view of each new challenge in our lives?

<u>Sept. 11</u>: Annie Welsbacher brings us "*Long to Belong*" by the Rev. Rod Richards. We'll explore the complexities of the meaning of the word "belonging," the human need to belong to something meaningful and larger than ourselves, and the differences between positive belonging and negative belonging.

<u>Sept. 18</u>: Rabbi Moti Rieber, Executive Director of Kansas Interfaith Action (KIFA), brings us an update about KIFA's work and legislative matters of special concern this coming year. KIFA is a statewide, multi-faith issue-advocacy organization that "puts faith into action" by educating, engaging, and advocating on behalf of people of faith and the public regarding critical social, economic, and climate justice issues. You are encouraged to invite your friends to join us for worship September 18.

<u>Sept. 24</u>: Rev. Joe Mohr returns to the pulpit to bring us his thoughts on the theme of "*Belonging*." Be sure to read the weekly Update or check the First UU Website or Facebook page for more information about Rev. Joe's presentation.

The Reign of Terror against the Osage people was one of history's most ruthless and shocking crimes. As the Wild West was dying, someone was killing members of the Osage nation who had gotten rich from oil under their land. Investigators who tried to uncover the truth were disappearing, but J. Edgar Hoover asked a former Texas Ranger to work with the Osage to unravel the mystery.
