"Sometimes All You Need is a Little Nudge"

Did you know that First UU composts its food waste as a part of its ongoing effort to support environmental reform? For the past three years, we have collected two buckets full of leftover food scraps weekly. It has then been picked up by Compost ICT or Serenity Farms. Both did a great job but have had to close their businesses. Nudge compost is now serving the same customers and has begun picking up our UU buckets on Fridays. Fortunately, they have agreed to do this for close to the same cost as before. By continuing this service, we hope to encourage our congregation to be aware of the importance of decreasing waste and turning what we do have into reusable compost.

Nudge compost believes that sometimes all we need is a "little nudge" and has dedicated their business to bring communities together and improve the health of Wichitans. Jesse Marks, the owner, started Nudge Compost a few years ago after completing a Masters in Public Administration. His final research paper was on food insecurity in Wichita. He says he learned about reducing food waste at the source, recovering edible food to reroute to food banks, and using waste for animal feed. Compost collected by Nudge is turned into power-packed soil at Wichita Dirt Co. They then make compost available to customers and donate to community gardens and area schools. Jesse admits that he may be an idealist but believes that a composting program has the power to bring about important change. We need more people like Jesse to make this world a better place! If you would like to know more about Nudge Compost or subscribe to their services at your home, you can email him at nudge also provides a self-service drop-off at minimal cost.

In the meantime, we need more volunteers to help pay for this service. First UU depends on generous members to donate to this cause. Jesse has given the church a discount, and if you are interested in continuing this service, you can help by donating all or a part of the \$65 for three months of service. This will help defray the cost for two five-gallon buckets to be picked up each week. Just let the church office know. For the past three years, about six people have taken on the cost because they believe in the cause and because donating gives those members the right to bring their compost to the church! When the church feels it is safe to start First Sunday Lunches again, there will be plenty of compost generated in the building for the two buckets to be filled. In the meantime, supporting this effort promotes our church values.

There have been a few changes to what is accepted by Nudge Compost. I have posted signs above the sinks in the kitchen. For the time being, they cannot accept meat/bones/or dairy. Plate scrapings, vegetables, breads, grains, and plant clippings are acceptable. If you have questions, call Marcia Ellsworth at (316) 208-3083.

Love is February's theme for Sunday worship services and Children's RE. Although Hallmark and other commercial enterprises have linked the February occasion of Valentine's Day with romantic love (and the purchase of merchandise and food they've deemed required to show it), the entity we call love has many dimensions. The February presentations offer four explorations of the topic. Please join us.

<u>February 5</u>: Melanie Jenney will present "Love 2.0" by Rev. Kaaren Anderson, Interim Minister at the UU Fellowship of Vero Beach, Florida. Anderson discusses and argues for us to change our view of love from one in which we think of it as a special connection with "one special person" to any moment "where we are given the gift of being pulled out of our isolation into a connection with someone else." She recounts her time at First Unitarian in Rochester, New York, and learning from the interpreters hired to accommodate their growing deaf ministry to arrive at her conclusions about changing the way we all think about love.

<u>February 12</u>: Debbie Wadman will present "*Tough Love Saves Us All*" by Rev. Gretchen Haley, cominister for the Foothills Unitarian Church in Ft. Collins, Colorado. Haley states that "Unlike partial communities that seek to put limits around love or duty, the Beloved Community is that community that keeps drawing the circle wider and wider still. It is a loyalty that is based not in our sameness, but to the Love that holds us across our differences." She encourages us "to call this love holy, to pledge our allegiance to it, which in turn requires a critical awareness of our own tribe, and our own trauma."

<u>February 19</u>: Rev. Joe Mohr will present "Love Me More." Sam Smith is a prominent figure in the queer movement across many cultures. His prolific song "Love Me More" speaks to the pain of self-acceptance that many face daily. Mohr observes that he often finds himself listening to this song to bolster himself to face every day's challenges. This Sunday, Joe delves into the notion of self-love and how it contributes to the overall self-satisfaction we feel in our day-to-day lives.

<u>February 26</u>: Vivian Minshull-Ford will present "Go To Bed Angry" by Rev. Emilie Boggis, cominister at Beacon UU Congregation in Summit, New Jersey. Boggis explores what makes relationships grow and last and what makes them fail. She then generalizes these behaviors to our relationships in the world at large, and what we can do individually to make this a better world. Boggis wrote this sermon in response to the theme of "Loving the Hell Out of the World" used a few years ago.
