### May 2023

So far we have had an easy Spring, with so much going our way. Our Covid numbers have been consistently down for many weeks. We haven't had a lot of severe weather. Winter has not hung on exceptionally long. We've had flowers, buds, grasses, and greenery to brighten our days lately. The wind has been exceptionally trying, though. It does remind us that we live in Kansas. All of this has not stopped our activity one bit. Our services have been consistently good, and we have had a Welcome Back Lunch and a First Sunday Lunch, both of which were major successes. I am so glad to see the church back in the swing of things. It is so good to see so many people whom we haven't seen in person since the beginning of the pandemic, and so many people we haven't seen without masks in a while. With the Covid rate at 6.6 percent as of this writing, we can look forward to more in-person activity. Our next potluck lunch will be a week later than usual because of the garage sale, on Sunday, May 14, which is also Mother's Day.

Our latest endeavor is the Whopper Garage Sale. It should be just as big as our last garage sale, which netted about \$4,000 for the church. There will be many different things for sale – books, kitchen gadgets, china, art, clothing, and much more. We need many people to help with sorting, pricing, staffing the checkout table, and helping customers. It is a ramshackle symphony of people working together that makes an event like this so successful. It is May 4, 5, and 6. You may drop off goods for the sale at the church between April 30 and May 3. See the article on the sale elsewhere in the newsletter for more details.

General Assembly (GA) is coming up, too, June 21-25 in Pittsburgh. This year there is also an online option, where you can attend workshops and events virtually. There are a lot of new things going on and so much to learn and so many people to talk to. Our church is allowed four delegates to GA, and the fee for online participation is \$300. The church may be able to assist with fees.

Thank you to the followup-caller volunteers who met April 18 to contact First UU members and friends about pledging for the 2023–24 fiscal year. We had a good turnout, with lots of enthusiasm and good ideas.

And thank you to those of you who have already pledged. For those of you who haven't pledged, our friendly volunteers will be contacting you to discuss your pledges and your ideas for the church as we grow into the future. Remember, we can't prioritize our spending needs until we know how much to spend — and we can't have that information until all of us have pledged. We are approaching the half-way mark to meet our tentative budget, and about one third of us have pledged. That puts us behind where we were at this time last year, in terms both of dollars and number of people.

Please get pledge forms into us by May 1 so that the finance team has time to prepare the proposed budget before the May board meeting. We will all vote on the final proposed budget at the annual meeting early this summer.

# UUA General Assembly in June

General Assembly (GA) is the annual meeting of our Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). Participants worship, witness, learn, connect, and make policy for the Association through the democratic process: our fifth principle in action. This year's GA is taking place in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, June 21–25. Anyone may attend, in person or online. First UU is eligible to have four voting delegates this year.

Important votes for delegates will be cast in June: election of a new, six-year-term UA President, who for the first time in recent history is running unopposed; extensive changes to the UUA bylaws, which include a revamping of our UU Seven Principles and transformation of our Living Tradition sources into a statement of Inspirations; approval of a Statement of Conscience, and some Responsive Resolutions. (You'll hear more about what all that means in the near future.)

# Candidate Biography Ned Lakin President of the Board of Trustees

I was raised in a liberal Mennonite home in south-central Kansas and have lived in this area most of my life. I majored in history at Bethel College in North Newton, Kansas, and graduated from there in 1969.

I first learned about Unitarian-Universalism in the mid-1990s and have grown to feel that it is the best "fit" for me as a place from which I can view, interpret, and live what I hope and believe is an ethical and useful life.

My professional life has included working for 24 years in an agency serving people with disabilities. Our agency had around 200 full- and part-time employees and a budget of several million dollars. In my capacity as Executive Director, I interacted with board members, staff, persons we served and their families, professional peers, state and county officials, accrediting organizations, and private businesses and individuals from whom we sought funding, support, and good will. I was fortunate to have an excellent team of managers to work with, and I am proud of the work we did together over that period.

My involvement at First UU of Wichita has been, and continues to be, a place and a mission in which I want to invest my time, talent, and "treasure"! I love the variety of people here and the openness with which we approach the world. I feel strongly that we have much to offer to our communities, and that what we have to offer is something our communities can use to build a better planet and a more humane world.

### Candidate Biography Charlie King Board of Trustees

Charlie has been a member of First UU Church of Wichita since 2008. He has a bachelor's degree in Theatre and has worked in many productions, sometimes on stage, sometimes as a stagehand and prop builder. He has volunteered in many capacities at First UU, including groundskeeper, kitchen cleanup, Worship Committee member, service leader, and presenter, and has served on two occasions in the past on the Board of Trustees.

Charlie draws inspiration from "Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part" and from the source of spiritual teachings of Earth-centered traditions, which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.

# From the Worship Committee

Creativity is the May theme for Sunday worship services and Children's RE. Creativity, as one UU minister notes about this month's theme, is an act of faith. And creativity, she continues, isn't restricted to what we think of as "art." It can include creating and living an artful life. The sermons selected from the UU Association's Soul Matters program for this month reflect on both creativity as a personal act and on how it intersects with faith. We also have a special guest speaker for the Mother's Day service.

May 12 marks the 62nd anniversary of a very important "creation" indeed. On May 12, 1961, the first annual meeting of the Unitarian Universalist Association in Boston was held. At that meeting, the constitution and by-laws were ratified for the new organization merging Unitarians and Universalists. We recognize May 12 as UUA Founding Day.

<u>May 7</u>: Charlie Jenney will present "*Courage and Creativity*" by Rev. Kate Dean, minister of the Rosslyn Hill Unitarian Chapel in Hampstead, London. Dean notes that creativity doesn't just emerge in the form of a final work of art, music, or writing or in a difficult problem solved. It requires time to plan, to mull things over and research the problem before us. And it requires encouragement from others and the courage to test potential solutions, fail, and keep on trying. The entire process can be a deeply spiritual experience that brings out our inner passions and our dreams. The service will also feature music from congregation member Corey Swertfager.

<u>May 14</u>: Julie Burkart, president at Wellspring Health Access and founder of Wichita's Trust Women clinic, will speak on the ultimate creative act: Motherhood. Burkart, a former First UU member and daughter of longtime member LaRilla Combs, has opened multiple women's regional clinics around the country and is opening a new one in the Wyoming region, where she and her husband recently relocated. She is back in Wichita for the birth of her grandchild.

<u>May 21</u>: Rev. Joe Mohr will address the topic of creativity in his monthly sermon. The service will also feature Scottish fiddle tunes from violinist Elizabeth Wallace and cellist and First UU member Susan Mayo. Mayo has been part of the Kansas musical landscape for more than 30 years as a cellist, composer, and community arts organizer. She is co-executive director of Flint Hills Counterpoint, an ecology arts project based in Marion County, Kansas, music director for Woodfest, Symphony in the Flint Hills's fall event; board chair of the Historic Sunflower Theatre, guest lecturer at Wichita State University, and a member of the Wichita Symphony Orchestra. Wallace was adjunct professor of viola and violin at Utah Valley University and Dickinson College and has taught at other universities. She was a member of the Utah Chamber Orchestra at Ballet West and has performed with the Utah Symphony and at Carnegie Hall. She has played with major artists, ensembles, and venues globally, among them Kronos, Juilliard, and the Chieftains, to name a few.

<u>May 28</u>: Magda Garrett will present "*The Creative Spirit*" by Rev. Janet Parsons, minister of the Gloucester Unitarian Universalist Church in Massachusetts. Drawing from the book Big Magic: Creative Living Beyond Fear by Elizabeth Gilbert, Parsons rethinks the meaning and source of the creative spirit and argues that all that is required for us to live creatively is that we give ourselves permission to be open to curiosity and risk taking; that we are willing to say "yes" to inspiration instead of "no," or "I can't."

The book discussion group will meet at our regular time and date, 11:30 am on the third Friday of the month, on Friday, April 21, beginning at 11:30 am for lunch with discussion to follow at 12:00 pm.

The book chosen for May is Trains and Lovers by Alexander McCall Smith. As they journey by rail from Edinburgh to London, four strangers pass the time by sharing tales of trains that have changed their lives. A keen-eyed Scotsman recounts how he turned a friendship with a coworker into a romance by spotting an anachronistic train in an 18th-century painting. An Australian woman shares how her parents fell in love and spent their lives together running a railroad siding in the remote Outback. A middle-aged American patron of the arts sees two young men saying goodbye in a train station and recalls his own youthful crush on another man. And a young Englishman describes how exiting his train at the wrong station allowed him to meet an intriguing woman whom he impulsively invited to dinner — and into his life.

After making arrangements to borrow these books from the Wichita Public Library, it was discovered that the group has read this book previously, so if you don't wish to read it again, you are invited to find another book about trains or a different book by the same author.
