August 2023

The month of July 2023 at First UU got off to an auspicious beginning when, at the end of June, one of our air conditioning units gave out! With the help of numerous members and friends of the church, we were still able to have our First Sunday Lunch on July 2. In fact, for me, it turned out to be a delicious, harmonious, and joyful event. I think it demonstrated what we are capable of as a group of committed people who are willing to join together to make good things happen—even under trying circumstances. And I hope and trust that this will be an ongoing theme of our 2023-2024 church year.

In addition to scheduling the mending of the air conditioner failure, we also completed the hiring of a new church office manager, dealt with the need to repair cracks and holes in the church's stucco covering, and entertained the prospect of adding some shading to the south side of the church building at Betty's Place.

Our new office manager (and relatively new member), Jon Ramirez, began his orientation and training for the job with Anita on July 10. Jon brings to the position years of experience with diverse groups of people along with knowledge of computer applications and systems. Report from the Board - Vivien Minshull-Ford

The Board of Trustees under the leadership of new President Ned Lakin met on July 19. The most pressing issue is the air-conditioning unit, which quit working right before First Sunday Lunch. The north side of the building was affected, including the kitchen. We set up tables at back of the sanctuary, which had AC, and ate Indian food in comparative comfort. In fact, many congregants said they really liked this new departure. The unit has been since been repaired. The board discussed the vexing issue of acquiring the necessary refrigerant, which is not EPA approved, to keep the four-unit system going. There was discussion of a geo-thermal system, much more in keeping with our environmentally beneficial philosophy, but we agreed to settle for fixing our existing system, and hope the other units hold up.

Another pressing issue is the repair to the cracked stucco on the east side of the church under the mural. The board agreed that we should go ahead, and members of the congregation will help restore the mural. Anyone who would like to help with mural painting, please contact Vivien Minshull-Ford or Marcia Ellsworth.

Ksenya Gurshtein is kindly donating funds to help purchase a sail design shade tent for Betty's Place, the outdoor playground for Children's Religious Education, so it can be used during the summer. This installation may necessitate moving the church name up higher so it can be seen from 21st Street.

Lynn Way will speak and help facilitate plans for a special service on July 30, "Sunday Sundaes." Six-and-a-half gallons of ice cream are being funded by coffee money, and congregation members are encouraged to bring toppings. See From the Worship Committee in this issue for more information.

The new board will meet in person, though the zoom option will be available for members who live out of Wichita or have other reasons for participating from home.

Over the next couple of months, I want to present tentative goals for this year to the Board and membership of the church. The major themes I want to suggest include the growth of our membership and involvement in the church; initiating plans to secure the financial future of the church; establishing a Technology Committee to guide us in taking advantage of electronic means to meet these goals as well as to facilitate intra-church communications; and bolstering our processes and structures for keeping current with our Bylaws, Policies and Procedures, Job Descriptions, Committees, and church functions and documentation, generally.

I consider being elected as President of the Congregation at First UU church of Wichita to be an honor and a privilege; and, with your commitment and support, I look forward to a very eventful year!

UU Art Notes: Artist Workshop August 6

The paintings hanging in the sanctuary are by artist and master frame maker Stephen Miner. His lovely landscapes are available for purchase: 30 percent of any sale goes to the church.

You may know Stephen better as the artist who showed fascinating themed shadow boxes of assemblages and found objects in our EcoFest art exhibition. It is astonishing that he can do paintings that are so different. I think many of us have favorites among the collection. If you are interested in knowing prices, please ask me or Marcia Ellsworth.

Our curator, Ernie Kind, recently hung a small exhibit of Hermine Greywall's paintings in the Zen Room, part of a sorting and evaluation of all the art works belonging to First UU. The Adult Religious Education room and the corridor leading to it will soon have a new exhibit, which includes works by Hermine Greywall, Helen Brewer, and New Mexico artist Kandy Tate. The room now houses two glass-fronted cabinets for our ongoing sale of collectibles.

Gaylord and Kind Exhibits, Lunch, Workshop:

Don't miss the art in the Gathering Space Gallery featuring works by Micala Gingrich Gaylord and Ernst Kind. Gaylord's memory sculptures memorializing the lives of deceased friends and family members can be accessed by opening your camera app and pointing it at the QR code under each work. The large sculpture on the right will reveal its sound bites if you shine the flashlight on it and find the right spot. Kind's fiber, fabric, and tie-dye exhibit also commemorates past lives.

Both Gaylord and Kind will join us for First Sunday Lunch on <u>August 6</u>. If you would like to ask questions about their work, plan on sitting with them. At 2:00 pm following Sunday lunch, Gaylord will conduct a workshop on memorializing dead people. The one and a half-hour workshop costs \$20. Materials will be supplied, and participants should bring a memento of the person they want to remember in sculpture. UU paganism, joy, and a special guest presenter are among topics and offerings for our August services.

On <u>August 6</u>, Melanie Jenney presents "Why I Am a UU Pagan." Ken Langer from a UU parish in Bedford, Massachusetts, begins this sermon with, "I want to take this opportunity to explain to you why I identify myself as a UU Pagan and why I think it is important that both UUs and Pagans take time to understand each other. I am a UU because I enjoy being in an open and accepting community of people with diverse spiritual viewpoints and I am a Pagan because my spiritual inspiration comes primarily from nature." Jenney will share Langer's perspective.

On <u>August 1</u>3, Charlie Jenney presents "Surprised by Joy," by Rev. Julia Hamilton. Joy shows up most often when we are present and open to the uncontrollable beauty of life. Joy recedes when we lose touch with the present, when we are so preoccupied with the future, with trying to control where things are going, that we can't see what delights might be popping up right in front of us.

On August 20, Rev. Joe Mohr returns to the pulpit with another of his monthly presentations.

On <u>August 27</u>, we'll hear from special guest speaker Rabbi Moti Rieber. Rieber – aka Reb Moti – has been executive director of Kansas Interfaith Action and its predecessor organization, Kansas Interfaith Power & Light, since March 2011. He is a graduate of the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College in Wyncote, Pennsylvania. A life-long activist on peace, social justice, and environmental issues, Reb Moti brings a variety of pulpit, interfaith, and organizational experience to the work of Kansas Interfaith Action. Reb Moti and his wife, Suzy, live with their three children in Overland Park.

Ripples from the Caring Committee - Magda Garrett

The Caring Committee is the arm of the church that responds to events in the lives of the congregants.

We acknowledge birthdays and other special celebrations with cards and kudos. In times of sorrow, we acknowledge and seek to bear witness to the pain. Volunteers associated with the Caring Committee can, at times, provide transportation to medical appointments, church services, and other church-associated events. Light meals and light housekeeping can be provided as needed due to illness, bereavement, or other. Reasonable requests for assistance will be accepted and support provided, always contingent on available manpower.

We are in the grip of a fierce hot summer and the weather can be unforgiving. Health professionals tell us those most susceptible to the extreme heat are the older and youngest among us. Remember to limit your outdoor activities to the coolest part of the day, stay hydrated, and wear protective covering if you are outdoors in the sun.

The Caring Committee hopes to continue the legacy of Susan Hund-Milne, who regularly donated extra produce from her garden, by requesting such donations from the gardens of our congregation at large. We can then sell the produce after church, with the proceeds going to the committee's emergency funds. Contact Magda for information and about how to you can help.

If you can help with occasional transportation to medical appointments and such for some of our congregants, contact Jana Rambo.

The Caring Committee maintains a small emergency fund used to provide cash assistance to church members in need. In addition, a person in need may occasionally show up at our front door. For them, we usually provide a Dillons gift card. If you are able to donate cash or a card, it will be distributed as needed. The Caring Committee is a good steward of your donation. You may donate through the church office. Thank you in advance.

Watch for monthly reminders of UU Friends lunch bunch. Turnouts have been great, and the food and fellowship most enjoyable. We meet the third Tuesday of the month. Given that some eateries are closed on Tuesday, we will likely offer occasional Wednesday lunch dates.

The church is fortunate to have in our service Rev. Joe Mohr, who is available to church members for confidential counseling at no cost. With recent losses, illnesses, and everyday stressors, you may find that you need Rev Mohr's services more than ever. Please reach out; we care about you.
