Mission and Continuity - Ned Lakin

I have been thinking quite a bit about "continuity" lately, particularly as it relates to our mission as a church.

And speaking of "mission," I was brought up short the other day when talking about a "mission statement" for our Church! To refresh memories for all of us, and for those who have joined us in recent years, in 2017, the board authorized a new, streamlined mission statement crafted by our Committee on Ministry. We are "A welcoming community with diverse beliefs united for positive change."

We may all use this now, as I will, whenever we are asked about what makes First UU special (or different) from other churches.

After having designed our mission statement, though, how do we now put flesh on the bones of this simple statement? And, beyond that, how do we decide if and when we may need to modify or recreate our church's mission?

These things are what I am talking about when I think of "continuity." People change, times change, and I believe that, as part of a larger community, we all need to be open to periodically reviewing our fundamental documents and our ways of operating if we wish to keep up with the times and forge a church that adapts to changing times and circumstances.

As I understood the effort, during this year's General Assembly, to change and "modernize" some statements and formal tenets of our Unitarian Universalist denomination, I could see some positives — even if simply in bringing us all to look at our church in, perhaps, a new way.

History, I believe, shows us that staunchly and stubbornly refusing to try (let alone accept) change ultimately leads to stagnation, ineffectiveness, and irrelevance.

We have all heard it said that "Change is the only constant." To the degree that this is true, our "continuity" - as a Church, a species, or a planet - is to reckon with change!

Ripples from the Caring Committee

The Caring Committee is the arm of the church that responds to events in the lives of the congregants.

We acknowledge birthdays and other special celebrations with cards and kudos. In times of sorrow, we acknowledge and seek to bear witness to the pain. Volunteers associated with the Caring Committee can, at times, provide transportation to medical appointments, church services, and other church-associated events. Light meals and light housekeeping can be provided as needed due to illness, bereavement, or other factors. Reasonable requests for assistance will be accepted and support provided, always contingent on available people power.

The Caring Committee maintains a small emergency fund used to provide cash assistance to church members in need. In addition, a person in need may occasionally show up at our front door. For them we usually provide a Dillons gift card. If you are able to donate cash or a card, it will be distributed as needed. The Caring Committee is a good steward of your donation. In addition, as you are harvesting the ends of your gardens, please consider donating extra produce to the Caring Committee to be sold after service, with proceeds going to this emergency fund.

Rampant Red Wrigglers

First UU members Melanie and Charlie Jenney have worms. Not the intestinal kind, the composting kind.

One of our projects is vermiculture, using certain worms that compost food scraps into nitrogen-rich castings. Those castings make excellent fertilizer that you can add to potted plants, a container garden, or an in-ground garden. The extra moisture can be drained off; gardeners consider the resulting worm tea to be "liquid gold."

It's pretty easy to start a bin with some shredded newspaper, organic matter, and red wrigglers. If this sounds like something you'd like to try, we will give you a batch o' worms to get started. Feel free to contact Charlie at CBJenney@gmail.com or either of us after church some Sunday.

From the Worship Committee

October brings darker and shorter days, and with them, interfaith observances acknowledging the approaching change of seasons. The month's theme is heritage, and in this five-Sunday month, we also enjoy two guest speakers addressing topics highlighting their own areas of expertise. We close out the month with a return appearance by the UU Pagans with a presentation on another holiday in the Wiccan wheel of the year.

On <u>October 1</u>, guest speaker Jay Price will share his research on the changing religious demographics of Wichita between 1950 and 2000. His research helps in understanding this transformation and how it has changed the city and society more generally today. Price is professor of history at Wichita State University and director of the Local and Community History Program.

During this week, faith tradition days of note include Sukkot: The Feast of Tabernacles (Jewish) <u>September</u> <u>9-October 6</u> and the Feast of St. Francis (Christian) on <u>October 4</u>. Secular observances of interest include Vegetarian Day on October 1 and Banned Books Week <u>October 1–7</u>.

On October 8, Rev. Joe Mohr returns to the pulpit with another of his monthly presentations.

Days of interest during this week include Indigenous Peoples' Day <u>October 9</u>, National Coming Out Day <u>October 11</u>, and the birthday of notable Unitarian poet e.e. cummings on <u>October 14</u>.

On <u>October 15</u>, guest speaker Rabbi Moti will offer a presentation about White Christian Nationalism. Vocalist (as well as Reverand) Joe Mohr will provide special music.

On <u>October 22</u>, Andrew Davis will present "*Why Can't I Read That?*" by UU Rev. Kaaren Anderson. In this year when book bannings are at a nearly unprecedented high in both number and nature of titles, this sermon explores the forces of and possible responses to the phenomenon. Special music will be provided by guitarist Tom Page.

Faith tradition days of note this week include Ayudha Puja (Hindu) on <u>October 23</u> and the death of doctor and humanist Michael Servetus October 27, 1553. Servetus was burned at the stake for heresy and is informally considered a UU martyr.

Secular days of interest this week include UN Day October 24 and Intersex Awareness Day October 26.

On <u>October 29</u>, Linda Jordan will bring us "*A Samhain Celebration: What is Beyond the Veil?*" reflecting the Pagan holiday, this year occurring October 31–November 1.

Faith tradition days of note this week include Reformation Day (Christian) on <u>October 31</u>; Samhain (Wiccan) on <u>October 31–November 1</u>, Halloween (multiple faith traditions) on <u>October 31</u>, and Día de los Muertos (mixed faith traditions within Latinx communities) on <u>November 1–2</u>.

On October 31, 1959, Unitarian and Universalist representatives voted to merge; the formal merge occurred May 12, 1961.

First UU's Adult RE classes meet at 9:45 every Sunday before church in person or via Zoom. Topics have included diversity and diversity training, humanism, racism, and interpersonal analysis.
