President's Thoughts: Matters of Concern for UU Members and Friends - Ned Lakin

January 2024

I am digressing this month from the themes of "Continuity" and "Investment" to share some concerns that are bubbling up among a number of UUs and UU congregations. These are related to the current efforts being made to change the Bylaws of the Unitarian Universalist Association. These changes include eliminating the Seven Principles, which have set out the foundation of our churches since the UUA was created. They also include other changes which — at least in the opinion of some UUs — will threaten not only to detach our "religion" from its history, but also to destroy the independence of the individual congregations' self-governance structure.

In the somewhat limited reading and studying I have done on these issues, my concerns are that the UUA is using some rather harsh and high-handed methods to push through an agenda in which ... "Antiracism itself is the hinge issue, the justification for everything else in the UUA" (from "Don't be Guilted into Giving Up the Seven Principles: Reflections and a Strategy," by Dr. Kenneth Christiansen, November 2022. Updated July 2023.)

As concerned UUs, I encourage all of us to learn more about these conflicts. We will be studying and discussing them in upcoming Adult Religious Exploration classes. Poetry Group Starts January 13 -Skyler Lovelace

Since 2020, the Zoom Poets of Wichita have been writing and discussing poetry using virtual tools. Starting in January 2024, we'll offer in-person meetings that are also Zoom-accessible. The first meeting will be held January 13. This session is open for enrollment until January 10.

Every week, inspired by a new topic, we post our original poems in our private online classroom and then gather on Monday afternoons to read and discuss the week's work.

In January, we're exploring ideas from "Wingbeats II: Exercises and Practice in Poetry." For the first 10 weeks, our topics are:

To participate fully in this group, you need to be comfortable using your own computer to access an online discussion board and Zoom. The in-person meetings happen at The Studio School near Lincoln and Grove and require climbing five steps to the building entrance.

1. The Board has approved a proposed budget for FY 2024-25, which will be presented to the congregation at the Mid-Year Business Meeting on Sunday, January 21, 2024.

2. The Board has appointed a board member to fill Andrew Davis' remaining term (June 30, 2024). Announcements will be made soon.

3. We are continuing to monitor Covid rates, although the County Health Department has changed its tracking method that we were using to implement masking, food and drink, etc. for the Sunday services.

4. We will be reviewing our Policy and Procedure Manual over the next few months and will be adding policies and procedures, as needed, to clarify or enhance the ways we manage Church business.

Eclectic Readers

The choice for our January book discussion is any book by Cormac McCarthy.

Cormac McCarthy (July 20, 1933–June 13, 2023) was an American writer who authored 12 novels, two plays, five screenplays, and three short stories spanning the <u>Western</u> and <u>post-apocalyptic</u> genres. He was known for his graphic depictions of violence and his writing style, recognizable by a sparse use of punctuation and attribution. McCarthy is widely regarded as one of the greatest American novelists. Among his books are "The Road," "No Country for Old Men," and "All the Pretty Horses."

We will gather on January 19 beginning at 11:30 a.m. for brown-bag lunch and followed at noon with discussion. Copies of his books may be borrowed from the Wichita Public Library and are probably readily available at local used book stores.
